This verse from Is 49:6 has three God - oriented components: **HOPE**, **MERCY**, **MISSION**.

HOPE: God was revealing through the prophet Isaiah to His people who were in exile in Babylon that their time of oppression and estrangement is soon coming to an end, so don't give up. He was keeping their hope alive!

MERCY: God was expressing His unconditional love and mercy to them by promising to take them back. Just as their sins brought them into a strange land, so too His mercy will take them back to their homeland. Sin separates us from God. God's mercy reconciles us back to where we belong in God.

I WILL MAKE YOU A LIGHT OF THE NATIONS

This year's Conference Theme was directed by the Lord when the Service Team met in prayer and deep reflection. The Lord is expected to speak to us directly during the weekend on the theme and as always the case He will challenge us both individually and collectively. Two short excerpts from a Catholic perspective are presented to help get a deeper understanding.

The first one is written by one Christopher Phillips in a publication named **CATHOLIC BUZZ.** It states, "Through the Prophet Isaiah, God is telling his people, "I will make you a light to the nations so that my salvation may reach to the ends of the earth. God's desire is very clear! He does not say, "I may make you a light", or "I think I want to make you a light." No, no! He said, "I will make you a light to the nations. "So if God is going to make us a light to the nations, why is there so much darkness in the world all around us? Here's the problem; He cannot make us a light to the nations if we do not want to be lights. God cannot make us "light to the nations" if we prefer to live in darkness, or we prefer to be indifferent – which amounts to darkness.

God is faithful and true. He never goes back on His promises. He is true to His Word. In Isaiah 49: 6, God is expressing His desire to enter into partnership with us where the task at hand is the salvation of the world. He has given us the easy part; to be His lights in the world. He does the hard part of making it all happen. We must first do our part – be lights to the nations.

A Catholic Commentary in Catholic Loyola Press states," Light guides us as we travel. Jesus guides us safely through life to our heavenly home. Light promotes growth and life. Jesus brings us everlasting life. Light warms and comforts. Jesus welcomes us and calms us. Light prevents crime. Jesus is goodness itself. Light dispels darkness, which stands for evil. Jesus pierces the darkness of sin and death and conquers them. All the darkness in the world cannot put out one candle flame. Jesus cannot be overcome by evil.

We often think of Jesus as our light. John begins his Gospel with "the true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world" (John 1:9). In the Nicene Creed, we call Jesus "Light from Light." Our greatest celebration, the Easter Vigil, opens by lighting a paschal candle from new fire and acclaiming the light of Christ.

A famous poem by Cardinal John Henry Newman begins, "Lead, kindly Light, amid the encircling gloom,/Lead thou me on." We pray for enlightenment to Christ and his Spirit, who came to us in the form of fire on Pentecost. Following their lights, we look forward to eternal light in God's kingdom where for all God's holy ones, "Night will be no more, nor will they need light from lamp or sun, for the Lord God shall give them light". (Revelation 22:5).

FIRST CATHOLIC CHURCH INTERNATIONAL CHILDREN'S DAY

A World Children's Day, in the wake of World Youth Day, will be held in Rome on May 24-26, 2024. Pope Francis made the announcement, "with joy", at the Angelus on the feast of the Immaculate Conception.

The initiative responds to the question, what kind of world do we want to leave to the children who are growing up now? "Like Jesus, we want to put children at the centre and care for them". The event will see thousands of boys and girls from all over the world flock to Rome. The idea of a Day entirely dedicated to the youngest among us had been proposed to the Pope by a nine year old child.

The main event will take place in Rome; however the Pope calls on Catholics around the globe to also celebrate this special day in their own Diocese. With this in mind, the leadership of the Renewal thought that some aspect of the Conference should reflect the Holy Father's advice. Based on the programme schedule, an activity will be held on Sunday Morning.

Excerpt s are now taken from Pope Francis's message to mark the occasion which he particularly addressed to children and in instances to adults. He said, "Children everywhere, are a sign of every person's desire to grow and flourish. You remind us that we are all children, brothers and sisters. We would not be alive unless others brought us into this world, nor could we grow without having others to love and from whom to receive love". The Holy Father went on to say to the children that they are a source of joy for their parents and families, but also for our human family and for the Church. Pope Francis in his address reminded us of children who are victims of war and violence, those experiencing hunger and thirst, those living on the streets, those forced to be soldiers or to flee as refugees, separated from their parents, those prevented from going to school, and those who fall prev to criminal gangs, drugs or other forms of slavery and abuse. He appeals to us to listen to their voices. We need according to the Supreme Pontiff to hear those voices, for amid their sufferings they remind us of reality, with their tearful eyes and with that tenacious yearning for goodness that endures in the hearts of those who have truly seen the horror of evil. Pope Francis ended his message by stating, "God has loved us from all eternity (cf. Jer. 1:5). He looks upon us with the eyes of a loving father and a gentle mother. He never forgets us (cf. Is. 49:15) and every day he accompanies us and renews us with his Spirit".

Matthew 19:14

The phrase "Suffer the little children" is from the Bible, specifically Matthew 19:14. The phrase means to allow children to come to Jesus and not to hinder them, either by word or by a bad example. Jesus encourages children to come to him, for of such is the kingdom of heaven. The passage refers to those who have the loving simplicity, humility, and trust of children.

EVANGELIZATION

"Every Mission of ours is born from the Heart of Christ"

The theme chosen for the Conference this year emphasizes mission as the theme points out that the Lord has endowed us with His light that His salvation may reach the ends of the earth. Mindful of this we present excerpts from Pope Francis' message for World Mission Day which was observed on February 2nd, 2024.

The Holy Father states that both before and after Jesus' resurrection, He told His disciples, "Go!", thus involving them in His own mission (cf. Lk 10:3; Mk 16:15). The Church, for her part, in fidelity to the mission she has received from the Lord, will continue to go to the ends of the earth, to set out over and over again, without ever growing weary or losing heart in the face of difficulties and obstacles. Pope Francis declares, "Let us not forget that every

Christian is called to take part in this universal mission by offering his or her own witness to the Gospel in every context, so that the whole Church can continually go forth with her Lord and Master to the "crossroads" of today's world".

In referencing the missionary zeal of the early Christians, the Holy Father stated, "They sensed the urgency of the preaching of the Gospel" and pointed out that today too it is important to maintain this perspective. According to Pope Francis the urgency of preaching the Gospel helps us to evangelize with the joy of those who

know that "the Lord is near" and with the hope of those who are pressing forward towards the goal, when all of us will be with Christ at his wedding feast in the kingdom of God.

In placing emphasis on synodality and its association with mission, Pope Francis states, "The mission for all requires the commitment of all. We need to continue our journey towards a fully synodal and missionary Church in the service of the Gospel. Synodality is essentially missionary and, vice versa, mission is always synodal. Consequently, close missionary cooperation is today all the more urgent and necessary, both in the universal Church and in the particular Churches.

The Holy Father ended his message by pointing to Mary's role at the first miracle performed by Jesus at the wedding feast, in Cana of Galilee (cf. Jn 2:1-12). Pope Francis encourages us by stating, "Let us implore her maternal intercession for the evangelizing mission of Christ's disciples in our own time. With the joy and loving concern of our Mother, with the strength of tenderness born and affection Evangelii (cf. Gaudium, 288), let us go forth to bring to everyone the invitation of the King, our Saviour. Holy Mary, Star of Evangelization, pray for us"!

Four (4) Keys to Unlocking the Power of Prayer

1. Make Prayer a Priority - Carve out a portion of time, maybe before you start your day, to center yourself in the presence of God

2. Practice Silence and Solitude

- The biggest reason why we should is that as Jesus modeled for us, it builds our relationship with God. Jesus' routine silence and solitude practice concisely: "Jesus often withdrew to lonely places and prayed. (Luke 5:16).

3. Lament with the Psalms

- Lament is defined as"a passionate expression of grief or sorrow." This "passionate expression" can unlock the power of prayer and actually lead to deep healing. More than two-thirds of the book of Psalms details some form of lament.

4. Pray for Others (Intercession)

- Praying for others also allows us to see past ourselves and gain perspective. That's not to say that our own wants and needs are not important. However, we clearly see Jesus put a high premium on extending our love out to others.
